Local representatives, Senator Ben Watson and Representative Jesse Petrea, led a seminar on April 6, with particular emphasis on Georgia's new law on election reform.

The process this year was the most divisive, argumentative session Jesse Petrea had ever seen, dealing with even whether the law needed reform. It was particularly ironic because the past two years after Stacey Abrams lost in a close race with her for Governor, most partisan Democrats never accepted the results claiming the system was rigged against Stacey Abrams. Now that the Democrats flipped the state blue nationally, they seemed to be happy with the status quo, especially with the flexibility that the emergency measures allowed for mail-in ballots.

The emergency measures allowed much higher vote totals for Democrats, especially with loose allowances on signature matching. In perspective, Jesse marveled at the out of date and time wasteful process of determining valid voters by looking at signatures. Signatures change over time; how do you check for stark differences?

## **Promoting Vote Validity**

The Republican dominated legislature quickly took the route of finding a better system of guaranteeing validity of the individual voter, especially on absentee ballot requests. A valid ID is easily determined by the driver license number, plus the last four digits of a Social Security Number, which 97% of all Georgians have. The other 3% can obtain an ID number for free from the County Board of Elections.

Georgia law never considered ballot drop boxes, but rule changes without legislature approval allowed them in 2020. The new law now codifies them as valid for the future, but restricting drops to essentially one per county, or 1 per 100,000 people, and only at early voting centers manned and open.

Limiting absentee ballots to those with prescribed reasons is not in the bill so anyone for any reason could request one – in contrast to states like New York or New Jersey.

Georgia wanted rules that could withstand any challenge that might go to the U.S. Supreme Court, or risk the bill being thrown out in its entirety for one feature deemed unconstitutional.

## **Security Paper to Prevent Fraud**

Another issue to be tackled was the possibility of newly fabricated votes being artificially inserted. This was addressed by using special paper that could not be duplicated easily, similar to the paper used in U.S. currency.

**Outsiders Promoting Voting** – the funding supplied by Mark Zuckerberg's millions was addressed by making those donations go through a state agency, so equal stimulus could be applied to all voting districts, nor just Democratic strongholds.

**Preventing Long Voter Lines** – funding for backup machines is to be supplied so that long lines are minimized. Also, the characterization by some press as voters in line close to passing out from thirst due to lack of water was absolutely ridiculed. Any groups wanting to do electioneering by passing out water and food to prospective

voters can still do so, but no closer than 150 feet of the polling station. If someone were thirsty, they can just walk the extra few feet to get it from the political operatives along with other free goodies. They can even keep their place in line and do it. Within 150 feet, poll workers can help by passing out water bottles or telling people where the water fountain is.

**Continuous Vote Counting** - The fiasco of Fulton County suspending vote counts until only Democratic counters were present after midnight was addressed by requiring continuous vote counting until done. This is the standard in virtually all voting sites across the U.S.

## **Other New Laws**

House Bill 168 was enacted that requires any parole proposal to notify the local DA and to allow that DA access to incidents and behavior during the convict's stay in prison.

The operative rule is that parole is a privilege, not a right, so secrecy is not an appropriate tactic for lawyers to use in trying to spring their client earlier than the specified at the original trial.

The mask in public prohibition law was changed to allow a physician's opinion on its appropriateness. The original law was enacted to outlaw Ku Klux Klan activities.

Lastly, the state is now empowered to preclude switching to Daylight Savings Hours, for simplicity statewide. If a business or enterprise wants to accommodate some of daylight savings advantages, it is free to change its working hours accordingly.

## **Question and Answer Session**

Several dealt with the potential unreliability of the new Dominion voting machines. The legislative committees were aware of these allegations during the voting design process. However, no credible evidence was submitted that allowed tackling that issue legislatively this session. Watson and Petrea reminded us that every legislative year, the subject of voting laws is an active topic, so that Dominion Machine validity could come up again in the future to be addressed by another legislative session.

Also, the authority of the Secretary of State being able to change rules came up. In the future the legislature clearly needs to be involved in any changes, as is authorized by both federal and state constitutions.

Some preferred limiting the reasons to request an absentee ballot, a feature in early consideration by the Georgia Legislature. One reason not to limit requests was to assure the final law was ultimately sustainable from any constitutional challenges. Best to have an excellent bill, even if it falls short of some views of perfection.

Oregon has had success in total voting by mail experience for over 20 years, and uses bar-coded envelopes to prevent outside substitution of fake votes. This was not considered necessary in Georgia, because of the requirements of two ID numbers (Driver's License and Social Security) as well as special security paper in the actual paper ballot.



## TRUE PERSPECTIVES SEMINAR - April 21 - Governor Kemp

On April 21, Georgia Governor Brian Kemp spoke at a Plantation Club luncheon hosted by SIRC. He first thanked the SIRC for accommodating his schedule by doing this on relatively short notice.

He led off with Georgia's pride in being one of the first states to deal head-on with protecting its vulnerable population from COVID, but also protecting Georgia citizens' paychecks by not following some of the federal doom and gloom recommendations on long shutdowns. Georgia's unemployment rate (4.5%) is way below the national average of 6%, and New York's 8.5% (and even Florida's 4.7%.)

Under some metrics, he says Georgia's business environment leads the U.S.

The successful recent legislative session has a balanced budget, and tax cuts (even despite the American Recovery Act's attempt to prevent that. In contrast to the fake Obama era shovel ready projects that never were there, Georgia actual had some that could produce real jobs in infrastructure.

Other successes included help to foster care and adoption agencies, as well as landmark efforts to combat human trafficking abuses in the state, that other states can emulate.

### Senate Bill 202

Contrary to national pundits claiming that Georgia's election law reform was rushed through, ignoring bipartisan advice, it was thoroughly vetted since first proposed in early January. Separate House and Senate Bills were reconciled in a thorough and effective law that expands voting opportunities, while safeguarding voting integrity.

As evidence of the insincerity of Democrat critics, they had coined the "Jim Crow on steroids" label long before the details were even fleshed out. To this day, critics have no specific objections to the law on any valid merit. Colorado, where the Baseball All Star game was moved, has way fewer voting options. New York still has required reasons to request an absentee ballot, and charges for an ID card, whereas Georgia has had them for free for over 15 years. (97% of Georgia voters already have a picture ID driver's license.

Republicans are highly united on the unfairness of the Georgia law criticism, and Kemp believes this is a winning issue in the next mid-term elections in 2022. When Ted Cruz and Mitt Romney agree on something, it is a super unifying topic.

Hence Governor Kemp is never going to back down on this issue, where 70% of the public supports having secure IDs to be able to vote. Is the bill perfect, perhaps not according to some conservatives that wanted limits on the reasons to absentee vote, but "don't let perfection get in the way of a good result". And Georgia's new law is way better than most others, which the Democrats choose to ignore. In fact, he suspected this whole furor was an attempted distraction from the Administration's induced humanitarian crisis at our Southern border.

### Question & Answer Session

Q.1. This led to the first question on how best to solve the Border Crisis?

A1. Kemp himself went to the Texas border to see how Georgia's national guard troops were doing when summoned there. While not able to actually apprehend illegals, they were performing a valuable role in detecting illegals attempts, using military vision sophistication tools, to alert the Border Patrols. Also, it was obvious how effective were the Trump built real walls and fencing on top to try to channel legitimate entry attempts for valid reasons.

He also sympathized with Arizona and Texas Governors declaring it a state of emergency to try to solve.

Q.2. Can Georgia do anything to restrict entry?

A2. Not much more than supplying the above national guard troops, as immigration authority is primarily national.

Q.3. Is there a real concern that the current administration can, by executive order, limit the effectiveness of the gun rights in the Second amendment?

A3. Not really. Kemp is a very strong supporter of the Second Amendment, and ran heavily on it in his Gubernatorial campaign. He is optimistic on retaining Second Amendment rights if Biden just sticks to his bully pulpit and a pen. Kemp is much more concerned if it takes a legislative turn to the left, via Senate control, or erosion of the filibuster.

Q.4. How effective is Stacy Abrams in controlling the issues?

A4. Assuming the voting law stands up, Kemp believes in the inherent good sense of the voters.

Stacy Abrams's articulation on the issues should paint her well out of the mainstream and a political activist and opportunist. Behind the scenes, he concedes she has been very effective. Especially in fundraising and intimidating corporations to appear woke by channeling funds to her causes.

Yet she also had to flip flop on the All-Star Game move's effect on Atlanta. 51% of Atlanta is black, where the move is causing economic damage to many workers and small business owners who are minorities. Compare that to Denver, Colorado that is less than 10% black population. So, who is being hurt by the false notion that Georgia's election law is "Jim Crow on steroids"?

Q.5. The last audience contribution was a suggestion.

A5. The vacant Atlanta baseball stadium during the All-Star game could be the site of a massive rally supporting Georgia's new election law. The Governor conceded it was a novel and good idea, but first needed the approval of the Atlanta Braves Baseball team,



## TRUE PERSPECTIVES SEMINAR - May 6 - Meg Heap

Meg Heap, former DA Chatham County, was recently appointed by Governor Kemp to the State Board of Pardons and Paroles, after having served with distinction as Chatham County's District Attorney for many years. Of the five State Board members (who serve for seven years), she is the only one who has been a prosecutor. The others were a state trooper, a civil rights and trial attorney, a state legislator, and a Parole Officer and Department of Corrections Commissioner.

Her reputation as not being soft on crime had preceded her appointment, so she has to be careful not to quickly upset a perceived tradition of being sympathetic to long serving criminals who may have repented and deserve early release.

### **Remember, Parole is a Privilege, not a Right**

She repeated the mantra that parole is a privilege, not a right. Also, early release means serving out the prison term in relative freedom, but still with restrictions, such as regular contact with parole officers. A key consideration is public safety. One parole violator claimed it was up to his Parole Officer to find him, instead of him having the obligation to maintain contact.

The State Parole Board also opines on possible full pardons when conditions warrant. They also rule on whether a condemned criminal can be granted clemency from the death penalty. Sometimes cases arise when the convicted murderer in a long sentence, but with a serious medical ailment, could receive more palliative care in a controlled medical facility, a sort of parole to a safer environment. A tough call, as the judge condemned him to a life sentence, or even execution, so what is the difference, if he has some suffering along the way, but much less than the human being whose life he snuffed out.

### **How Thorough is the Research Needed Before Parole?**

All in all, the job requires much research on each individual case, that now has more authority to delve into a candidate's behavior in prison, as relevant to whether he should be released to the public under parole supervision. Also, now the victim of the candidate's crime has a right to be told of a possible parole of the perpetrator. Sometimes it is a close call on whether a denial of guilt is just evidence of lack of remorse, and therefore not deserving of parole.

Georgia has a program to allow the victim to confront the parole-seeking prisoner in a safe, controlled environment. Sometimes this is good to promote closure on a tragic event that had happened years ago.

Recall that of the 47,000 inmates in state prisons, 21,000 are seeking early parole release. Is it unfair to contact the prosecuting attorney to see if a plea bargain was involved, so that the real more serious charges are not readily recorded on the reason for prison? Doesn't the risk to public safety mean that the worse charges not formally brought can be considered?

Formerly, life sentences were being considered for parole as early as 14 or even seven years. Now the minimum is 30 years served time before consideration. Amazingly some 10% of those having served 30 years do get Parole.

It sounds like Meg Heap's serving on this Board may bring a needed, fresh new look to what has been routinely done for years. (One of the audience questions was whether published recidivism rates by state are relevant to evaluating a Parole Board's efficacy? For example, Georgia's parole success rate has been 15% higher than the national average. What is Georgia's recidivism rate versus the average? Are Georgia's rehab and entry preparation better than average?)

### **Question and Answer Session**

These dealt with effect of COVID on prison population, to the fallout from "defund the police" and "no bail" movements. Her view is best summed up by whether your own children's misbehavior has real consequences or are you all talk and no action?

On July 16, Ladies on the Right (LOTR) invited our **State Representative Jesse Petrea** to discuss some important developments in the Georgia Legislature. He led off with the reminder that Georgia is one of 15 states that have so far called for a "Convention of the States", a US Constitution procedure that allows States to amend the Constitution. Nine other states have already passed this Call by one of their legislative bodies (needs the other and gubernatorial signing to complete). When 34 states agree, the Convention call, is for a proposed agenda limited to two issues: a federal balanced budget, and term limits for federal offices. Some had feared that a Constitutional convention is risky in that the agenda could go wild with other issues, but the participation has been limited to the above two topics, Many states have a balanced budget mandate, and many have term limits in various offices.

## Election Security

Next, he covered the rationale behind Senate Bill 202, which Progressives have erroneously labelled "Jim Crow on Steroids" Ironically and hypocritically, virtually all of the prior Jim Crow laws attempting to limit former slaves from voting were actually enacted by Democrats.

Senate Bill 202 has nothing to do with race, but everything to do with expanding access to voting, but doing it securely and with integrity: Easier to Vote; Harder to Cheat. Also, ironically, Georgia's new law has much more voter access than most liberal states, including Delaware (Joe Biden's home state) and Colorado, where Major League baseball succumbed to liberal pressure and moved the All-Star Game (thus hurting many black owned small businesses in the Atlanta area).

Having observed the problems with the last election in Georgia with all the pandemic "fixes" to try to retain access, they started with the Absentee Ballot provisions. Nowhere in Georgia history did they allow "drop boxes" on street corners, with little control on voter eligibility.

First, the notion of signature comparing is now viewed as impractical, with too room for error. Many people have a hard time even repeating their signature accurately, not to mention the time-consuming process of election officials scrutinizing signatures. The simple fix was putting your state motor vehicle license number on the envelope. 97% of Georgia's citizens have a driver's license. The other 3% can easily get a voter ID card for free in any county in Georgia.

Next drop boxes are allowed, but at secure locations with Election officials present – where it is very hard to do ballot harvesting, and a chain of control is possible. Next, the

paper ballot system was improved by having security paper, supplied by the Election officials. One can't try to duplicate a sample ballot and try to have it count.

## Q&A Session - Voting Integrity

Q1. Why didn't the Georgia Legislature limit Absentee Ballots to only those with a valid excuse?

A1. This was debated, but the Election Law Legal Counsel felt this was controversial, as to limitations, such that a legal challenge, if upheld, might invalidate the whole law and lose the remaining compelling advantages.

Q2. Wouldn't a full forensic audit of Georgia find other flaws in the pandemic- modified voting rules that could yield other laws to prevent fraud?

A2. The law now enacted is fairly robust in preventing fraud. It may a long time to conduct an audit, and the new law is in place to govern the next major election in Georgia in 2022.

Q3. Is everyone comfortable with the Dominion voting machines in Georgia?

A3. One observation is that Trump won on the Dominion counts. but lost in the Absentee Ballots. And the initial recount of Dominion votes in Georgia balanced to the paper copy votes. (Editor's note: in the recount, many observers saw paper ballots that were not creased: meaning they never were sent in an envelope, and are therefore fraudulent. Also, many observed black circles for Biden that looked computer printed and not filled in by an actual voter; More de facto evidence of fraud. How about having the election board of Fulton County releasing the actual paper ballots, or has enough time elapsed for them to "crease" thew uncreased ballots?

Q4. To enhance voter ID, did you consider modern technology such as eyeball scans or finger prints?

A4. Not really, as the driver license ID number is the easiest and least intrusive fix.

Q5. In Chatham County, how can we fix the duplication and bureaucracy between the Elections Board and the Board of Registrars?

A5. Republicans are still a minority in County politics, where those decisions are made.

## Q&A Other Issues

Q6. In the 2018 Mid-terms, the Democrats advertised heavily late that the GOP did not have a viable alternative to ObamaCare. This swing voters to flip the House and get Nancy Pelosi Speaker again. In 2019 your Bill in Georgia guaranteed access to affordable health insurance, and a way to get means tested pre-existing condition coverage. Your Bill did not pass for several reasons, one of which was a reluctance by Georgia to fund the pre-existing pool without guaranteed federal grants like under Medicaid. In 2022, this issue will also me strong in voters' minds. What kind of help is needed to get a state replacement to Obama Care Bill passed early in 2022.

A6. Georgia Legislators had a lot on their plate in 2019 for a Bill this sweeping to pass in one session. It will take a major effort to get it done in 2022. (Editor's Note: Passing a state replacement to ACA will not only help Georgia Republicans, but other state GOP candidates can now have an answer to Democrat skeptics. Also, a state alternative to ACA will give standing to Georgia to have ACA declared unconstitutional, The Federal government can't mandate coverage provisions, e.g., free pre-existing condition coverage, just as they couldn't mandate that young people buy overpriced health insurance to help subsidize older insureds, 7-2 SCOTUS vote to ban that.)

Q7. How can we combat current federal pushes to indoctrinate students with progressive ideas like the 1619 Project and counter culture movements and identity politics?

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**August 19, Buddy Carter**, our Georgia Representative to U.S. Congress, discussed some important developments on the national and international scene.

This is his fourth term in Congress, and he has never seen such foreign policy failures – not just at the Afghanistan withdrawal disaster, but at our porous Southern border almost from day 1 of the Biden administration.

On the total abrogation of the positives that Trump had done to secure the border, Buddy Carter believes it is not just Biden's incompetence at immigration policy, but his succumbing to the progressive left's intent to implement open borders. Their goal is to get amnesty for over 15 million illegals today, to ensure a permanent Democratic and dependent majority in ruling America.

The Biden Administration pretense about caring for young people was illustrated by Kamala Harris, the so-called Border czar, who avoided a visit to the Border for 93 days. Only when ex-president Trump planned a visit did she decide to go to El Paso, 800 miles away from the sector that had the most illegal crossings. Most of the now one million illegals have crossed in broad daylight in the Rio Grande Valley near Brownsville, the closest entry to most of those coming from Central America. And not just asylum seekers but drug dealers, gangs, sex traffickers and terrorists as well. Harris never even got to the actual border, but just stopped at an airport in Texas on her way to California.

Had she been to the crossing hotspots, she would have seen children detained in PODs designed for 33 children each, but containing up to 500 each. She would also have learned that these temporary quarters were just that, until

illegals were further shipped all over the U.S., many to communities not aware of such incursions.

The Biden administration should have also known that the drug cartels controlled most of the crossings, charging up to \$14,000 each to cross. If illegals still owed on their crossing tariff, they had a separate color wrist ban.

The drug cartels also smuggled huge amounts of fentanyl across, enough lethal doses to kill four times the U.S. population.

Then there is the COVID non-testing of the border crossers, estimated to be at least 25% positive, and shipped all over the US without identification. So much for being responsible to prevent the spread. And while Buddy Carter is a firm believer in the advisability and efficacy of the COVID vaccines, he is vehemently opposed to federal government mandates. Educate motivate the public; we are not a third world dictatorship.

### Q&A Session

Q1. Is there any traction from reminding the Biden Administration that their border policies flagrantly violate Article 4 of the U.S. Constitution?

A1. None. They completely ignore anything that does not coincide with their agenda. Joe Biden thinks he is a dictator and he is above the law.

Q2. Does Nancy Pelosi realize that many of the new illegal entrants are more culturally aligned with conservative values?

A2. No. She thinks she is adding to the Democrats base when in reality these immigrants are trying to escape the socialist regimes they are currently under. They want the freedoms we have now. Nancy Pelosi and the Democrats want the socialistic government they are trying to escape.

Q3. There is a rumor that GA Governor Kemp volunteered a place in Georgia to house many of the Afghan refugees fleeing the Taliban, not just the interpreters who helped us over the last 20 years. Is there a concern that many of these are hard to screen for sleeper terrorists?

A4. Yes, thanks to the Election Integrity Act passed by the Georgia State Legislature we can be more confident that every legal vote will be counted and no illegal votes will be counted. While not perfect, the law makes voting easier and cheating harder.



## Need New Way to Donate to Federal Elections

The Federal Election Commission donation rules are so onerous that we are effectively precluded as the SIRC from making donations to federal elections, especially under a Democratic administration.

Our most generous members were also constrained by our having a maximum Sustaining Membership fee of \$100.

Here is a new paradigm:

Create new levels of membership above the level of Sustaining Member, for those who can contribute as individuals to federal elections:

Diamond: \$10,000 or more,

Platinum: \$5,000+,

Reagan: \$2,500+,

Gold: \$1,000+,

Ruby: \$700+,

Silver \$400+,

Bronze: \$200+.

Sustaining: \$100.

We keep tabs on those pledges. They should write the checks payable to the federal candidates and PACs. – not to SIRC. They can place those checks in a special box at our Presidents Day Dinner fundraiser, or drop them off at several SIRC sites throughout Skidaway Island.

We then publish the enhanced donation names in our Magazine above the level of Sustaining Member. Those levels would stay in place for at least a year.

*See sample Magazine page, on Page 8, recognizing possible generous donors.*

This would be our new way of acknowledging those contributing at each level. The levels are based in part on the limits the Federal Election Commission allows on individual contributions in a single year.

Our annual fundraisers and membership dues will still be used to contribute to crucial local and state races. But we are now effectively precluded from donating, as an organization, to federal elections (e.g., House, Senate and President).

See in the right hand column what we published in an article in *SIRC Magazine* last Fall. Next year will contain any new addresses for PAC donations.

## Advantage of New Policy

Many who donated via credit card in 2020 may be regretting the convenience, as they are now deluged with unsolicited emails asking for future donations. This new method of bundling checks would restrict that in the future.

## For U.S. House and Senate:

Where is the biggest bang for the buck? Who is in a position to know? Our U.S. Representative Buddy Carter is part of several committees to help evaluate which House seats are most likely to flip back.

And is recommending GOP faithfuls give to those committees. Senate counterpart PACs also exist that those PAC committees. Senate counterpart PACs also exist that can channel the funds where they might have the most impact, especially being attuned to the latest realistic polls.
